

> 1. All students taking Military Science are NOT compelled to register for physical education activity classes.

2. Students who are registered for Military Science MAY elect any one credit hour activity course in physical education which meets their interest and recreational desires, Several courses are available at all hours in the day for recreational physical education, each carrying regular credit.

3. Students who have seen military service, and who are not taking military science are not compelled to elect classes in physical education. However, hundreds of veterans are electing courses and all are open to veterans at their pleasure,

4. on your veteran's account the same item twice." For example, a book obtained by a veteran the first semester, and used during a subsequent semester in another course, may not be obtained again. Books and non-expendable supplies that are lost, stolen, mutilated or disposed of will not be replaced at government expense. During the rush of supplying books to several thousand students the first of the scmester, it is inevitable that some veterans may have had a book or certain supplies reissued to them. In such cases you would be doing yourself and the university a favor by returning such items to the store at once.
