The prizes include original etchings, lithographs and silk screen prints made by members of the art department faculty. Submit to Papers.

Prize winning articles will be submitted to the Daily Nebraskan and the Lincoln Newspapers for publication. Mrs. Paul Royal, president of the Lincoln Artists' Guild, will be the final judge,

All university students are admitted free to the exhibition, upon presenting their identification cards, during regular gallery hours which are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, 2 to 6 p.m., Sun-days. Tuesdays, galleries will re-main open until 9:30 p.m.

Rules. Rules for the competition, which

will be in two classes, those written by students in general and those by art majors, are: 1. All undergraduate students

taking at least twelve hours credit are eligible.

2. Articles should be between 500 and 1,000 words in length, and must be clearly written or typed, double-spaced, on one side of the paper only.

3. Articles must be endorsed on the back of the last page with name and address of the entrant. and name of his major subject or college in the university.

4. Eentries must be at the Art Department office, Room 207, Morrill Hall, before 5 p. m. Monday, March 17.

Public Relations.

The University also hopes to strengthen its program of public services to the people of the state. It is estimated this will require \$1,697,000.

Due to the war, many university buildings, and the grounds which surround them, have deteriorated rapidly because of lack of materials and manpower. To "catch up," and to meet day to day requirements, the university has allocated \$1,100,000 for main-tenance and repair for the next two years. The remaining five per cent of the budget will go for administrative expenses for the university as a whole.

Two Women ill Receive Scholarships

Two senior girl scholarships of \$75 in recognition of meritorious efforts in school life and scholastic attainments have been offered by the Faculty Women's club,

Any girl attending the university who has sufficient hours to graduate in June, 1948, or at the end of the summer session of 1948, is eligible for one of these scholarships. Requirements are that a candidate must be wholly or partially self-supporting and maintain an average of 85.

Candidates may secure appli-cation blanks at the offices of the Registrar, the Dean of Women or Miss Margaret Fedde, chairman of the home economics department. The applications must be mailed to Mrs. Norman Hill, 2924 South 26 street before March 15

Before sending applications to the scholarship committee, candidates are requested to give the Registrar's office written permission to send their grades to the scholarship committee.

Personal interviews will be held in Ellen Smith hall on March 20 between 2 and 5 p. m. Special appointments may be arranged with Mrs. Hill if an applicant is unable to meet at the scheduled time.

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
