Cast Your Ballot

Today's election with one of the largest slates in the history of Student Council is more than a matter of selecting from the 78 candidates those who are best qualified. We can repeat endlessly "Everybody vote. It is your duty to vote." But still only the few interested students will bother to come to the Union basement today and take a few moments to mark the ballot.

Perhaps it wouldn't matter so much whether your interest was aroused in this election if you were voting only on names of people, but today the first constructive work in strengthening the Student Council is up for the decision of the students.

We have advocated a complete revision of the constitution and we still mean it, but if the proposed

changes are adopted by you at today's election, one great step forward will have been made.

The most important change suggested is that of Article VIII on the judiciary committee. This committee enforces the rulings of the Council and is the group which takes final action.

Until now, only six members made up the committee and all six of these were seniors. Since most of the Student Council members are representatives of the junior class, it is only sensible that they be on the judiciary body. If you want Council power to reflect the desires of the student body, vote "Yes" for this revision.

Other changes are concerned with the date of the spring election and with increasing possibility for campaigns in future elections. Lack of interest in the voting of past years can be directly traced to the ab-

sence of information about candidates and the restrictions placed on the possibility of ever getting that information. Students had to go on hearsay or depend on someone else telling them how to vote.

These revisions have been badly needed by the Council for a long time. They are first start toward a good Council.

The polls will be open today from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. in the ping pong room of the Union. Each student will vote only for those candidates from his college. Those who are in the various schools of Arts and Science college must vote only for the candidates from their school. All students are eligible to vote for Publications Board, according to class, and for Ivy Day Orator. All you need is an ident card and the will to vote.
