Gladwin Young Compares U.S. Life With Russ

Life on farms in Byelorussia, in the south central part of Russia, is primitive compared with American standards, Gladwin E. Young, field representative of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, told students and faculty members attending a university convocation Tuesday afternoon.

"It will be a decade before mechanization of farms can be brought back to the standards reached by Russia in 1940," Mr. Young said. "It will be a generation before farm home conveniences such as pumps, good cook stoves and heating units are available. It may be many generations before farms will have such luxury items as power washing and sewing machines and electric lights.

"Farm people in Russia were friendly and hospitable; they realized their debt to us," he continued.

During the six months he spent in Russia in 1946 as USDA representative, Mr. Young made many Kodachrome slides, which he showed following his brief talk.
