

Three Groups Of Art Exhibits At Morrill Hall

With three groups of art exhibits on display at the same time in Morrill Hall—the largest of which is the 11th annual All-Nebraska art show—this reporter was impressed with the fact that here was a free exhibition which students might well pay to see, for the entire exhibit has a welcomed freshness and vigor.

Among the works by Nebraska artists hung in Gallery "A" are "Tragedy of Hamlet" by Keith Martin, best-known exhibitor in the show, whose style and technique have turned from the conventional to the surrealistic. One that catches attention immediately as one enters the gallery is Marian Hatten's "Yard Birds," (nothing to do with GI's!) which places interesting bird forms on a vivid yellow background.

Suicide Rock.

"Suicide Rock" by art instructor Murray Turnbull is exciting both in abstract composition and use of color. "Doris Resting," by student John Kirsh (omitted by mistake from catalogue) is an outstanding piece in figure composition. Two lively watercolors were entered by Ted Butterfield, manager of the Lincoln Symphony orchestra. In "Sandhill Canal" (see cut) Butterfield's

In the corridor outside the galleries hangs a collection of contemporary paintings by young French artists.
