

# Husker "B" Quint Routs Trade School Five, 66-31

A torrid second-half scoring spree netted Coach John Thompson's Nebraska B quintet a 66-31 victory over the Nebraska State Trade School of Milford five in Tuesday night's Nebraska-South Dakota preliminary test.

The Nubbins held a 21-16 halftime advantage, but roared back after the rest period to turn the curtain raiser into a definite rout.

Sparked by Forward Thurman Wright and Guard Anderson the B crew took complete command to rack up its first win of the season. Wright shared high scoring honors with Anderson. Each potted 11 counters.

Coach Thompson used ten men in the contest with each of his varsity hopefuls denting the scorers column. Fritz Simpson whipped five field goals through the hoops for 10 points while Center Bob Allen tallied nine points for the Husker reserves.

Carl Samuelson, burly Husker football tackle, and Jack Pesek, wingman and top flight punter for Coach Bernie Masterson's Scarlet gridders, were at home on the basketball court and joined the scoring parade with three field goals each for six point totals.

Spark for the outclassed Trade School five was Center Blacker who connected for eight points. Forward Hendrichs tallied a single field goal and converted four charity tosses for a six point total and second high scoring honors for the Milford club.
