Because of the board's silence after the original announcement, rumor has spread that Biff Jones or Dana Bible will return to the Cornhuskers as the new director. It is to be hoped that the university athletic board makes some definite announcement as to their plans within the next few days before the rumors get too deep.

At any rate, the athletic board is to be congratulated on taking a positive step which should go a long way toward putting Nebraska back in the win column in all sports.
