Activity men must maintain a 4.5 average (or a weighted 75) the previous semester and carry at least 12 hours. Freshman and first semester transfer students cannot have more than 2 points. Sophomores cannot have more than 4 points, nor more than 3 if their average is under 4.5. Juniors cannot have more than 6 points, nor more than 4 if their average is under 4.5. Seniors cannot have more than 7 points, nor more than 5 if their average is under 4.5.

The Uni-Vets did sponsor the Veterans Convocation last Tuesday. It was to present the report of the National Conference of Veteran trainees. The convocation was not sponsored by Operation Subsistence. Operation Subsistence did not sponsor the National Conference of Veteran Trainees.

The Uni-Vets have never sponsored any program the least bit "shady" and will not do so in the future. Our records are open for inspection at any time and our activities are undertaken only with a plurality of the membership present at the meetings. . . .
