Prexies Disclaim MB's, Innocents' Approval of NSA

Because of current interest in the National Student Association, The Daily Nebraskan is reprinting the following statement which appeared in the form of a Letterip in the Wednesday, Oct. 8, 1947, issue.

The statement was made follow-

Stan Johnson, Innocents president, and Joyce Geddes, Mortar Board president, in a special joint statement to The Daily Nebraskan Thursday afternoon, said, "As a body, neither the Innocents nor Mortar Board society has taken a definite stand on NSA. The letter (which appears below) was written primarily to arouse student interest and not primarily to endorse the organization. We do not speak for the societies since neither has had any discussion on this question since the letter was written last October."

At an Innocents meeting following the NSA forum Thursday, the majority of the members of the senior men's honorary voted to approve Johnson's statement.

ing the first preliminary meeting which presented NSA to this campus, and a week before the presentation of the NSA agenda to the Student Council.

To the Student Body:
"The Innocents and Mortar Boards, university senior honorary societies, having met in joint meeting, wish to announce to all students that we have voted to give our endorsement and support to the National Student Association.

"Believing it to be an organization worthy of the support of the entire university, we wholeheartedly recommend that all students take an active part in furthering its aims and aiding it in carrying out its proposed national program.

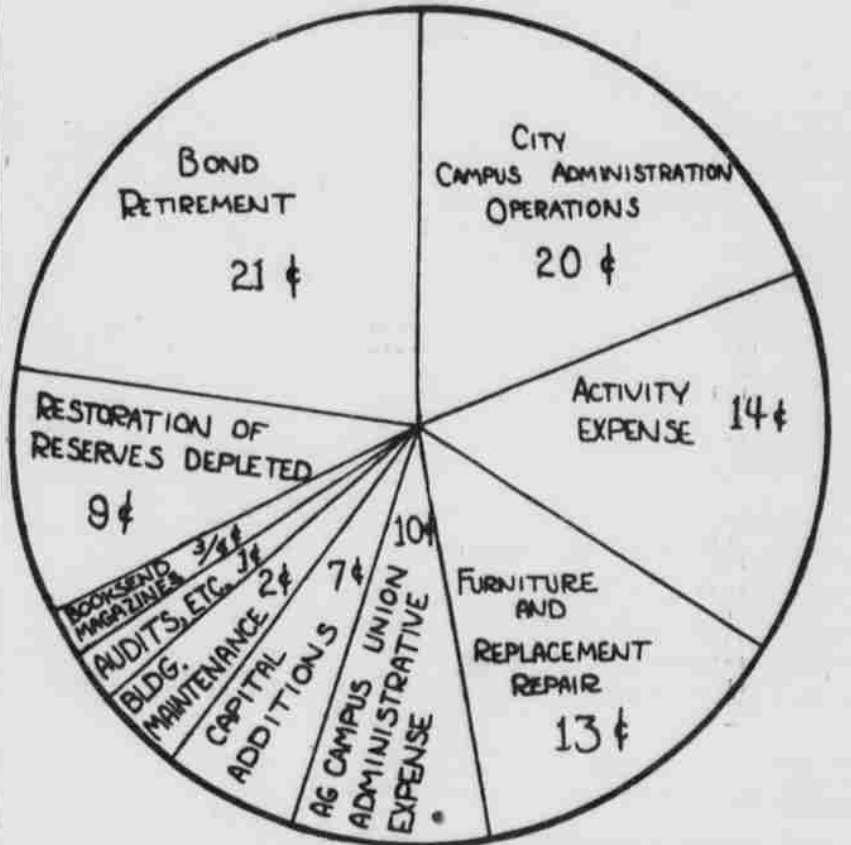
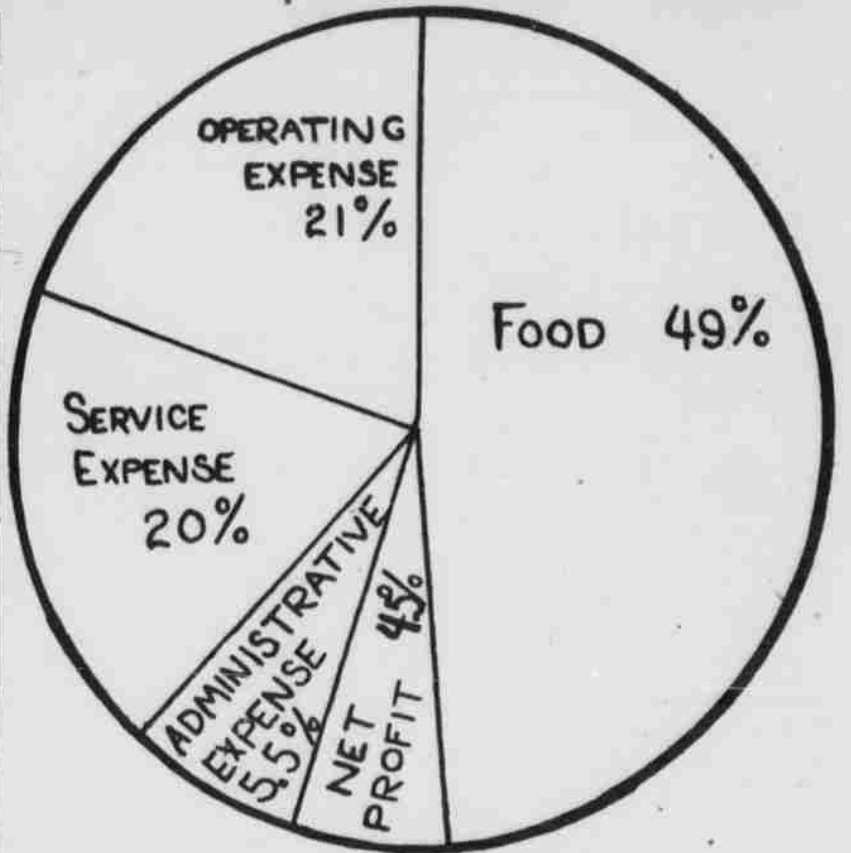
