Roger Watts of Iowa State broke the old 220-yard free-style record when he swam that distance in 2:16.2 in the preliminaries. Watts also broke the record in the 440-yard freestyle in the preliminaries, stroking that event in a time of 5:04.

Sam Shiffler of Iowa State won the diving with a 46-point mar-gin over second place Fig Flagg of Nebraska. Flagg edged out his teammate Roger Moore for sec-ond position. Dick Bell of Ne-braska took fourth to give Ne-braska their biggest single event total.

In the closest race of the day, Conrad King of Nebraska placed third in the 200-yard breaststroke. King was less than a foot behind the winner, Howard Johnson, of Iowa State. Johnson's time was 2:41.3. The 150-yard backstroke was a race between Crowder of Oklahoma and Robison of I-State, with Robison winning in a time of 1:44.9. Crowder set a new record in the prelims when he swam the event in 1:42.6.

Sloan, Western Union guard,


and Hanson, center, led the Iowa quintet's attack with 12 and 11 points, respectively.
