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OIL THE MACHINERY . . .

When the Daily Nebraskan set out to furnish students with a series of thumbnail sketches on candidates for offices in the student spring election, we thought that a compilation of the filings and a listing of the candidates would be a routine task.

Such was not the case. The gathering of the complete filings has turned into a real project which has taken the energies of several reporters.

In the process of collecting a comprehensive list, we have run into several unexpected rebufs. Some Student Council officials seemed to regard the request for a list of filings as an intrusion in a private matter. The Council itself set the election date with an eye toward allowing ample time for a public airing of the platforms and campaign promises of the candidates, but in some way the election machinery ground to a near-halt so that the additional time provided by the Council was minimized.

Several times during the year Student Council business has been slow in coming to the fore. Vigorous publicizing of student council action is a tonic for drowsy government. The Daily Nebraskan will do its bit to provide regular doses of such an invigorating remedy, in the hope of lubricating the slow-moving functions of our student governing body.

ADVANCE NOTICE . . .

For the first time in several years, Nebraska students will have a smattering of advance information on the candidates for student council positions and on publication board positions. As was mentioned above, the Daily Nebraskan was unable to gather a complete list of filings in time to present platforms and sketches of candidates for all offices. But it is encouraging to note that there are some aspiring office holders who have given enough thought to the election to have evolved a platform.

A small advance when compared to the flamboyant promises of candidates in local, state and national elections, but in a campus election which promises to occur without any organized parties, the ideas of individuals are the only measuring stick. And we will be inclined to string along with candidates who have made known their views rather than to take a shot in the dark by supporting a silent candidate.

Writers Guild To Hold 47th State Session

The 47th semi-annual meeting of the Nebraska Writers Guild will be held next Saturday at the Cornhusker hotel. Registration for the day-long session for members and guests will begin at 9 a.m. A luncheon will be a feature at 12:15 p.m.

Speakers will include, Dr. J. M. Reinhardt, University of Nebraska sociology department, Lincoln Police Chief Joseph T. Carroll, both speaking on the "whodunit"—and how for mystery and detective story writers. Scott Greenwood, secretary-manager of the Nebraska Press association, will speak on the services the association offers writers. Jim Raynard, director of public relations for Goodyear's Lincoln plant and editor of the plant paper, will discuss non-fiction.

Others to speak will include Dr. J. C. Olson, superintendent of the Nebraska Historical society, Mrs. S. A. Lutgen, Wayne, Neb., and Dr. L. V. Jacks, Creighton University, Omaha, past-president.

A short business meeting for members only will be held at 10:30 a.m. with Miss Joan Cosgrave, president, giving an "Off the Record" talk. Miss Louise Snapp will conduct a display of published works by guild members.

Festival Set For Saturday

Early American dancing and folklore will be the theme of the eighth Annual Folk Festival, held the afternoon and evening of Saturday, April 17, in the Coliseum.

Starting at 7:30 p.m. with a concert by the University Brass Choir, the evening program will consist of a grand march at 8 p.m. and three demonstrations performed by local square dance clubs and the women's physical education department of the university. General participation in square and round dancing will fill the remainder of the evening.

Letterip

Dear Editor:

The purpose of this letter is to acquaint college students with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. A college chapter of the NAACP will be organized at the University of Nebraska Wednesday evening, room 316 in the Union at 7 p. m., to which all students are welcome.

The NAACP was organized in 1909 for the purpose of winning for the colored people in the United States equal rights and opportunities for their own and the nation's well-being.

It is the aim of the college chapter of the NAACP to reach the students and to stimulate in them an awareness and understanding of the political, social, educational and economic problems which confront the American Negro.

Upon this we hope to build a strong student organization which will be a center of education and action in the struggle of the association for the full constitutional rights of 14,000,000 colored Americans.

The NAACP has demanded and fought for equality before the law, economic opportunity, and a breakdown of those barriers which have hindered the Negroes in their right to work and their chance to rise.

The association has fought for an anti-lynching law, a fair employment practice law, and the elimination of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting, the abolition of segregation in the armed

services, in interstate travel, and in places of public accommodation.

All work of the association has been carried on within the framework of the Constitution and state laws. For the solution of the problems which vex us, the Association insists upon the application of the DECLARED principles of America to all our peoples. These principles, applied with equal justice, are a complete answer to all other isms. Much remains to be done before America will in truth be America, as the President's Civil Rights Committee found.
