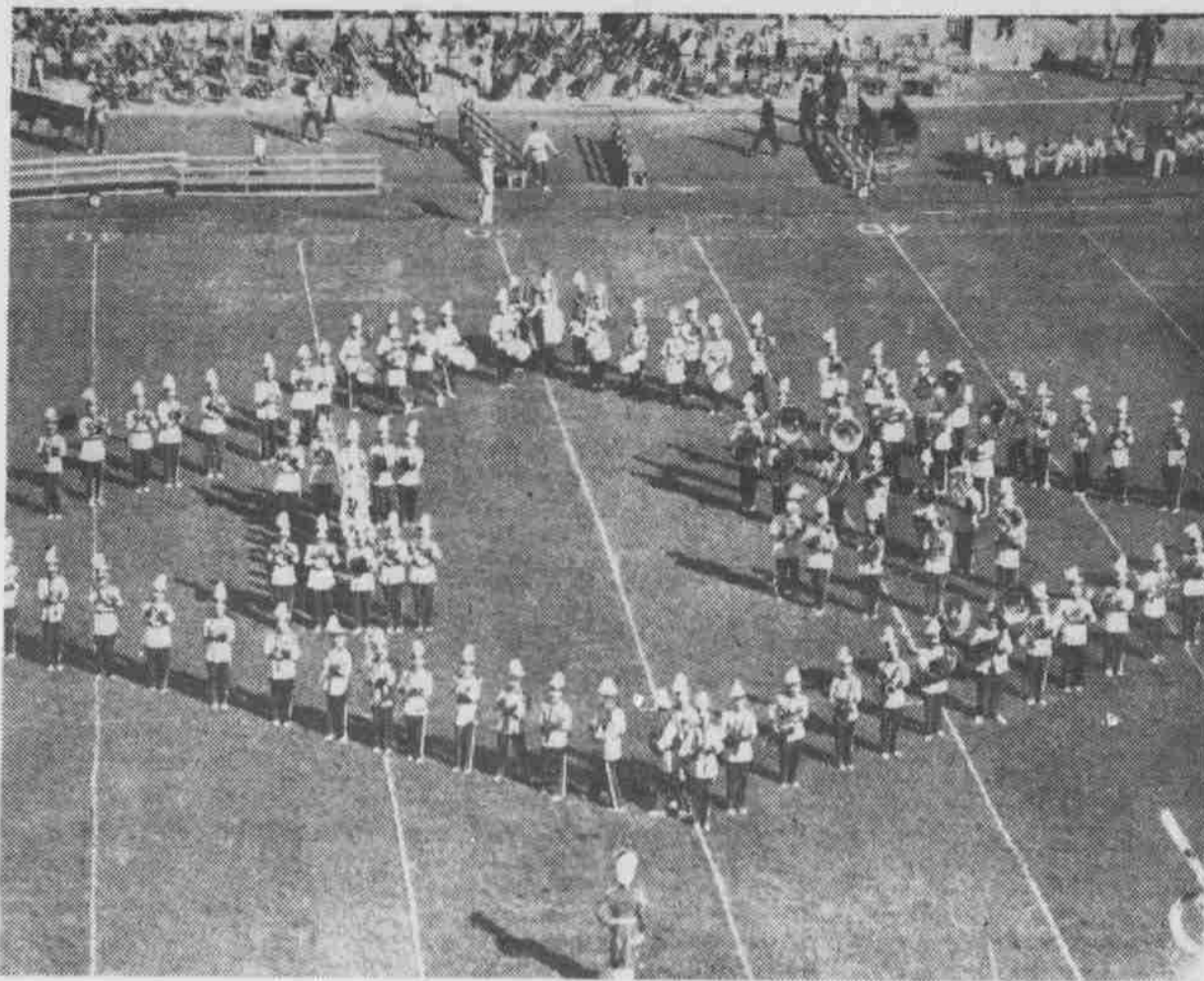
Free cokes and cigarets will be served to all who attend the mass meeting.

Thirty-Five Freshmen Take Oaths as Midshipmen, USNR

Capt. William L. Messmer, professor of naval science, has announced that 35 first year students have begun professional careers in the U.S. Navy by taking their oaths as midshipmen, USNR.

If successful in their four-year course, which includes three summer cruises, the midshipment will be commissioned as ensigns in the Navy.

Of the 30,000 high school students across the nation who took examinations to qualify for mid-

shipmen training, 2,000 appeared before boards of review. The 1952 class was selected from this group.

Those who are enrolled as midshipmen receive tuition, books, uniforms, an a \$50 monthly allowance from the Navy during training. In return they agree to serve a minimum of two years as naval officers upon graduation.

In addition to the midshipmen class, the department of naval science also has a first year class of 24 contract students who are required to take one summer cruise.

Successful contract students receive reserve commissions upon graduation.
