Film Adoption Of Gorki Novel To Run Friday

"The Lower Depths," famous French film adoption of Maxim Gorki's renowned novel, will be the first of this year's series of foreign movies sponsored by the YMCA.

The epic will be presented Friday, Oct. 8, and Saturday, Oct. 9, in Love Memorial library auditorium. Admission will be 50 cents. Tickets may be purchased at the door or in advance at the YMCA office in the Temple or at the YWCA office in Ellen Smith hall.

Star of the film is the French dramatist, Jean Gabin. Louis Jouvet, Vladimir Sokoloff, Susy Prim, Junie Astor and Jany Hoyt complete the cast. Directing is the world-famed Jean Renoir.

"Time" Magazine Lauds Film

From the article in the Sept. 20, 1937, issue of "Time," came the following summary and criticism.

"Pepe" (Jean Gabin), a handsome thief, lives in a basement flophouse run by a receiver of stolen goods, Kostylev (Vladimir Sokoloff) and his wife, Vassilissa (Susy Prim), Pepe's mistress.

Police Threaten

"Threatened by police, Vassilissa attempts to force her pretty little sister, Natacha (Junie Astor) to marry a pudgy petty official. In a resulting brawl, old Kostylev is killed and Pepe goes to jail. A new ending, wildly different, but approved in script form by Gorki before his death in 1936, has Pepe mysteriously out of prison walking hand in hand with Natacha down a country road.

"Cinemanateurs who like to think that foreign films are invariably inferior to the domestic brand will be surprised if not chagrined to learn that "The Lower Depths" won France's Young Independent Critics' prize as "Best Film of the Year and brought its director, Renoir, a knighthood in the Legion of Honor.
