The examination is open to plicants. men only, and the age limits for Applic appointments are from 23 to 40. However, applications for the examinations will be received from persons who have reached their twenty-first birthday. Due to per-sonal risk involved, applicants must meet rigid plf sical standards.

Starting annual salary for Treasury Enforcement agents is \$3,727.20, but agents with some special qualifications may be appointed at an entrance salary of \$4,479.60 per year. All these posi-


