The Nebraska five will be looking for its third victory in a row tonight, having won over Harvard and Kansas in their two previous outings.

The Huskers showed vast improvement in the Saturday game, both offensively and defensively. Their adept defensive play is best shown by the fact that Kansas was held to only four field goals in the first half and six in the second, a total of ten. The NU quint also set up a barricade around the boards and held the Jayhawks' rebounding to a mini-

Retnerford's shift to guard proved successful as he turned in a sparkling floor game and racked up 11 points. The Nebraska of-fensive as a whole was far less erratic than their last appearance here. If the Huskers can play consistent ball of this type on the road, they will be a definite

threat in the Big Seven title race.


