Junior Judges Take Honors

The university junior judging team placed fifth at the Southwestern Livestock exposition in Ft. Worth Saturday, according to word received from Prof. M. A. Alexander, coach of the team. There were 14 teams competing in the event.

A five man team composed of Merwyn French, Robert Eggert, Norman Holmberg, Stan Lambert and Duane Sellin competed in the contest.

Lambert and Eggert tied for ninth place in the entire contest. The team placed second in sheep, fourth in horses, sixth in cattle and ninth in hogs.

In individual events, Lambert ranked third in sheep and tenth in cattle, while Eggert was eighth in hog judging. French and Holmberg were ninth in sheep and horses respectively, and Sellin placed tenth in hogs.

A three-man meats judging team made up of French, Eggert and Sellin with Holmberg as alternate will compete Feb. 1 in the meats event. Charles Adams is coach of the meats team.

Nebraska's junior meats judging team placed fourth at the Ft. Worth Southwestern Livestock Exposition Tuesday. It was their last competition in the show before returning to Lincoln.

The team was composed of Merwyn French, Duane Selling and Robert Eggert. They placed second in beef and fifth in pork, lamb and grading. Charles Adams is the team coach.

Individually, French and Sellin tied for eighth in all classes of meat judging. French was third in beef and fourth in pork. Sellin placed fifth in beef.

Dr. Borgmann Named Chem Group Member

Dr. C. W. Borgmann, Dean of Faculties, has been made a member of the advisory committee on Basic Research in Chemistry of the Office of Naval Research. Chancellor R. G. Gustavson announced his appointment Tuesday.

Dr. Borgmann was in Washington, D. C., Tuesday to attend a meeting of the committee, which is composed of ten top-ranking chemists. While in Washington Dr. Borgmann also is completing details of transferring from the University of Colorado to Nebraska a research project on corrosion. Dr. Borgmann was director of the project as head of the Engineering Experiment station when he served at that university.

Borgmann has also worked on the engineering research staffs of the Bell Telephone Co., the University of North Carolina and the National Tube Co., prior to coming to Nebraska.
