



Council Announces Traffic Rule Changes

A modification in campus traffic regulations designed to streamline the process of obtaining parking permits was announced Thursday by Robert Axtell, chairman of the Student Council Traffic committee.

New students, or those who have recently acquired automobiles, may obtain parking permits by:

(1) Filling out an application at the Union office and presenting their university identification card.

(2) Presenting the approved application to Sergeant Furrow, head of the campus police force, at his office in the West Stadium.

IF THE APPLICANT'S Lincoln residence is more than eight blocks from the campus, or if the applicant is physically handicapped irrespective of location of residence, he is eligible for a permit, Axtell said. Faculty members or students with mutilated or lost stickers may have them replaced by going to Sergeant Furrow's office.

Parking space stall capacity has been increased the past semester to a point where it now accommodates over 1,500 vehicles in special parking lots on the campus.

Axtell said the traffic violations remain the same: improper parking, parking by fire hydrants, not parking between stall lines, speeding, no sticker, double parking, failure to observe stop signs, red line parking and careless driving.

REGULATIONS ARE enforced in this manner:

(1) All violators of University of Nebraska traffic regulations will be given official university police tickets. The ticket will request the violator to report to the Office of campus police in the West Stadium during specified hours on specified days.

(2) Students who fail to report to the university police office within a week will be summoned to the office of the dean of student affairs.

(3) Students who continue to violate the regulations will be asked to report to the office of the dean of student affairs for appropriate action. This action may include: placing the student on probation, referral to the city traffic court, suspension and the recommendation to the Board of Regents for expulsion of a student. Appeals from decisions made by the dean of student affairs may

be taken to the Faculty Conduct committee.

Last semester, Sergeant Furrow reports, 2,600 violation tickets were reported.

Instructor OK Necessary on Add Worksheet

All students adding courses must have the signature of the instructor or of the chairman of the department on their worksheets before going to the assignment committee in Temporary building B, according to Dr. F. W. Hoover, assistant registrar and assistant director of admissions.

Students may drop and add in Temporary B until Saturday noon and after that in the Administration building. Despite a shortage of drop and add forms, the assignment committee handled a normal number of students Thursday.

The University of Nebraska is unique in that it does allow students to make as many changes as they wish in order to have the best program, according to Dr. Hoover. Students may drop and add throughout the semester, rather than only in the first days, as in many universities.

"Students are amazingly cooperative, very patient and very courteous. I have observed this as long as I have been wrestling with this problem of registration. The faculty, too, has been very cooperative," Dr. Hoover said.

Directory Agents Get Point System

A revised point system has been devised for the number of Student Directories sold by all salesmen. One point will be credited for every ten directories sold before Jan. 2. For every one sold on or after Jan. 2, one point will be awarded.

This is an official confirmation according to Gene Mitchell, Student Foundation president.
