

Graduate Club Forum Hears Religion Views

"Only the University as a whole can give religion a place on campus," Rev. Rex Knowles told a Graduate club forum at the Union Friday night.

Knowles spoke as a member of the religious element on the campus at the forum discussion on the place of religion in college. Speaking as a member of the student body was Bill Reuter, Y. M. C. A. student president, and Dr. Clarence C. McNeill, chairman of the department of economics, gave his views as a faculty member. Hal Scheidt, Graduate club member, led the forum.

exists to show people the most effective way of living," Rev. Knowles, Presbyterian Student House pastor said. "If religion is left out, part of the truth is left out."

He referred to a plan now in use at the University of Michigan as an example of what the University administration could do to promote religion on campus.

At Michigan, Rev. Knowles said, a coordinator of religion has been elected to the faculty. A special building known as the Hall of Religion, houses all offices of churches represented on campus. Courses in each denomination are held by the student pastors each semester.

"The coordinator has the power over religion similar to that of the chancellor over the entire university," Knowles said.

AS PROOF THAT MANY students on the Nebraska campus are interested in study of reli-

gion, Knowles referred to the large attendance at the Bible study course which is held on Monday and Wednesday mornings at 6:30 at the Presbyterian Student House.

In the opinion of Dr. C. E. McNeill, religion on the campus benefits students to the extent that students think about brotherhood and the inter-relationship of all students.

"As a whole, the groups and houses on campus provide a wholesome friendly atmosphere for students," Dr. McNeill commented, "but these groups could go further in social improvement by extending brotherhood be-

yond their immediate surroundings."

BILL REUTER REPORTED that student committees attending the United Students Christian conference at Kansas University in December drew up three purposes in college life. They include: (1) training for the best life possible; (2) an opportunity to search for

and find the best life; (3) development of integrated personalities.

"The university curriculum should include religious subjects if the student is to accomplish these purposes," Reuter declared. "Students must have the opportunity to come out with a philosophy of life or the university fails in its purpose," Reuter said.

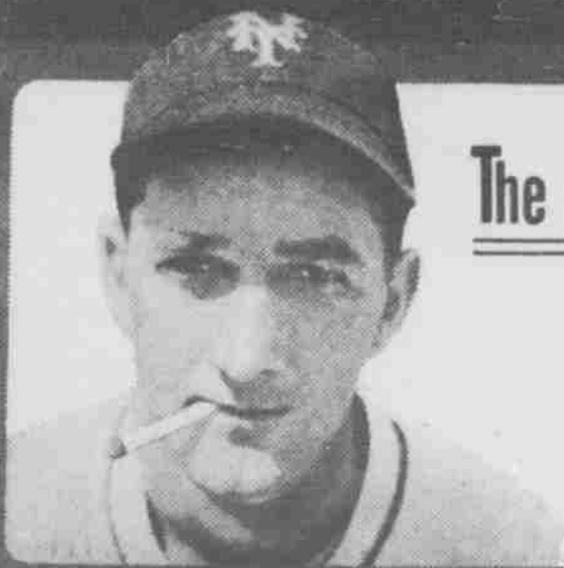
