A quiet place to collect yourself and your thoughts is the Episcopal chapel where All-University Vespers are held every Thursday at 5 p. m.

Originated by the YWCA, Vespers are designed to be a short 25 minute service in a religious, yet non-denominational atmosphere.

NOW DIRECTED by the Vespers planning committee of the Religious Welfare council, the service combines music and scripture readings with speakers who discuss topics of current interest.

A wide variety of topics are discussed by outstanding speakers throughout the year. Recent speakers have included a state senator; the director of CROP, European food relief project; faculty representatives; and Dr. Albert Rosenthal, UNESCO commission member.

A musical meditation is sometimes held when there is no speaker.

DURING THE YEAR, a stu-

dent leader from each religious group on campus conducts the service as it would be conducted in his church. Music is furnished at each service by the Vespers choir, directed by Myra Hauge, and by Ginger Samuelson, who plays the organ.
