

Husker Netmen Prepare Team for Oklahoma Jaunt

Wednesday marks the beginning of the 1949 tennis season, according to Coach Francis Leighton. The boys have been working out for a couple of weeks, but Leighton withheld the official season in order that several players on the Nut House squad would be able to compete in the National AAU tournament in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Three returning lettermen will provide the backbone for this year's squad. Robert Slezak, Jack Cady and Woody Ostergard will all be back for another session on the courts.

Leighton has four other men who he feels will bolster the team in the coming conference season. Don MacArthur, who was ineligible last year, was one of the best high school tennis stars who ever played for Lincoln high. Jamie Curran, up from the freshman team from last year, will be a strong contender. Bob Means

and Keevin Moriarty will also be looked upon for points.

THE HUSKERS will travel to Oklahoma in two weeks for a series of practice matches. They will tangle with the Oklahoma Sooners April 8 and the Oklahoma Aggies on April 9. Both teams are very strong and Coach Leighton is expecting plenty of opposition.

The team will work out in the Coliseum every day from now on. They appear to be a little stronger in the third and fourth positions than last year and may come up with a winner in the conference season.

First of Series On State P.E. Programs Held

The first of a series of state conferences of directors of physical education, health, recreation and athletics of Nebraska colleges and universities offering professional courses and teacher training programs was held at the University of Nebraska during the recent State high school basketball tournament. Louis E. Means was host to the meeting on the Nebraska campus. A similar conference will be held in Lincoln on May 14, and several more are proposed later.

Purpose of the conference was to discuss common problems concerned with professional teacher training in the fields of health, physical education, recreation and athletics; study of existing curricula; needs of Nebraska schools; and upgrading of professional offerings in all teacher training institutions.
