Mr. Means, who has been director of physical education and intramural sports here for the past four years, has announced that he will enter the sporting goods and television business in Los Angeles, Calif.

Mr. Means has done a great deal for the average man in the University who does not have time for varsity athletics. He has buit a new and enlarged sports program which is one of the outstanding programs in the country. He has added new and more popular physical education courses which have resulted in greater enrollments. Several leading universities use his book, "Oorganization and Administration of Intramural Sports," as a text in their professional courses. Mr. Means has served as president of the Nebraska Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, and he has served as chairman of several national and district professional organizations.
