World recognition honors in the field of botany came to two uniersity faculty members during the summer months.

Dr. John E. Weaver received an invitation to serve as honorary president of the International Botanical congress, to be held in Stockholm, Sweden, in the late summer of 1950. The meeting will bring together all of the world's greatest botanists. The invitation was extended by Dr. C. Skottsberg, Sweden, congress president.

Dr. Weaver, who has been a member of the University faculty since 1915, is a specialist in plant ecology. During this time he has published 12 books and mono-
