

Council to Hear Reaction To Proposed Constitution

Suggestions and ideas from students will be heard at the Student Council meeting this afternoon concerning the proposed Student Court Constitution.

Students wishing to express their views may appear before the Council at 4 p.m. in room 315, Union.

Sections III and IV of the Constitution are printed below, and the remainder of the plan will appear in Thursday's edition of the Daily Nebraskan.

Students are reminded that this draft the Constitution is still in the state of being changed and revised.

ARTICLE III PRE-TRIAL PROCEDURE

SEC. 1 Reporting violations.

Complaints of violations coming under Article 1 Section 1 may be reported to the University Administration or the President of the Court by any faculty member, student, student organization or a person not connected with the University. However, judges of the Student Court in no case themselves make complaints.

SEC. 2 Investigating complaint: notifying parties of the trial.

On being informed of the complaints, the President of the Court determines what investigation is necessary. He may have one or more members of the Fact-Finding committee look into the matter. Members of the Fact-Finding Committee report their findings to the President of the Court. If the President determines that it is necessary to have a trial, he has the Clerk notify all parties involved and complaints of the time

and place of the trial and the charges.

If the President of the Court determines that it is unnecessary to have a trial regarding a particular reported violation, he nevertheless informs the Court at its next session that the violation was reported to him and tells his reasons for not bringing the case to trial. If a majority of the Court disagrees with the President and decides that the trial should be held, the particular case is called before the Court at its next session.

ARTICLE IV Sessions

SEC. 1 Time and place of trials.

Sessions of the Student Court are held at a place, day and hour set in the by-laws of the Student Court.

SEC. 2—Disqualification of judges

A judge must disqualify himself or be disqualified by the President of the Court from a particular case when:

- (a) he has witnessed the violation, or
- (b) was personally involved in the violation or is a member of a student organization that was so involved, or
- (c) is a relative or close friend of the person charged.

Applications may be secured at the School of Music office. These must be turned in to the Sinfonia mailbox in the School of Music by Jan. 6.

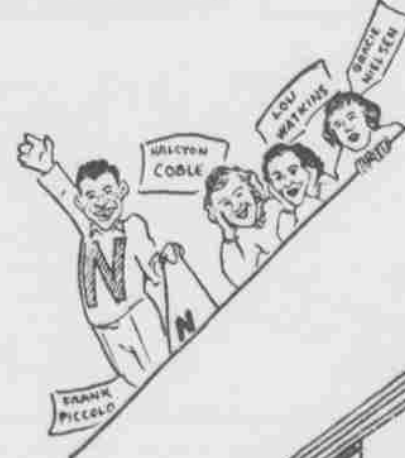
