What is the Student Council doing about its own constitution?

After talking with several Council members, we are of the opinion that very little is being done. Research is being carried on concerning political activities on local, state and national levels, and other schools are being questioned about their political set-ups, period.

This year's Student Council is operating under the same constitution which drew so much fire last year. Its articles and provisions have been violated, both last year and this semester, yet no revision has been offered. Several deviations from the present constitution have already occurred.

For instance, members are not chosen from colleges, as provided. No Council election was held "not earlier than April 1 and not later than May 15 of the school year preceding that in which the members are to serve." No general spring election was held "not earlier than April 1 and not later than April 20, the exact date between these limits to be determined by the Student Council."

Fact of the matter is, the main reason for disbanding last year's Council was unfair representation, even the members were elected according to constitutional provision. This in itself is reason enough for the present council to devote a greater share of its time in drafting a new constitution.

At present, the Council is concerning itself, primarily, with a Student Court constitution. In principle, the Court is a fine idea, but the Council's own constitution is certainly more important. A new semester starts Jan. 30. A new Student Council constitution should be drafted very soon after Jan. 30.
