Husker Frosh Win Big 7 Indoor Meet

Scoring in every event, the University of Nebraska freshman track team won the annual Big-Seven conference indoor postal track meet as compiled by Reeves Peters, commissioner of the conference.

The junior Huskers edge Missouri freshmen by 9 10 of a point for first place. Nebraska scored 469 10, Missouri 46, Colorado 40 7 10, Oklahoma 26 2 5 and Iowa State 20. Kansas and Kansas State did not enter.

Three Winners
Nebraska showed good team balance in placing in every event. Hobe Jones in the 880, Don Coupens in the pole vault and the mile relay team were the only Husker first places.

Jones, the frosh high-point setter, won the half in 1:52.3, placed second in the 440, fifth in the mile and ran a leg on the winning relay team.

Coupens far outdistanced the field in the pole vault. His winning height of 12-10 was almost a foot better than second place.

The relay quartet of Dale Schnackel, Bob Barchus, Chester Scott and Jones nipped Iowa State by two-tenths of a second.

Good Performances
Several top-notch performances were turned in in addition to the vault and half mile.

Bob Woods, Colorado hurdler, tied for first in the highs with Renner and Fessler of Missouri in 47.3 and won the low barriers in .87.1. Both times are just a tenth of a second off the winning performances in the recent conference indoor meet at Kansas City.

Jim Robertson, Iowa State strong boy, won the shot put with a 48-11 1/2 effort. Becker of Missouri nipped Nebraska's Warren Jensen for second by 1 1/2 inches at 46-6.

Three high jumpers, among them Irv Thode of Nebraska, cleared six feet or better. McNeal of Colorado was the winner at 6-1 1/2.

Beeline Second
Harold Cox of Oklahoma won the broad jump at 22-7 1/2 with Glen Beierline of the Huskers second at 22-3.

ATOs, Fijis Each Gain Three Spots

Three men each from the champion Alpha Tau Omegas and Phi Gamma Delta "Bees" spice the All-Tourney "A" and "B" selections Thursday. Sigma Nu and Phi Delta Theta each earned one position on the "A" team while two Phi Deltas held own the remaining berths on the "B" outfit.

Hobe Jones and Mack Robinson top the All-Tourney class A team. These two Taus were by far the outstanding men on the floor in their respective positions.

Jones did a terrific job of controlling the rebounds in the ATO sweep to the championship in addition to playing a great floor game.

Robinson Tops Scorers
Robinson was the top scorer of the tourney with 29 points, 21 in the first game. In addition, he played a very good game at guard, giving his opponents very few shots.

The third Tau on the first team is Jack Carroll. Carroll played an aggressive game at forward and continually got more than his share of the rebounds, as small as he is.

Joe Gurnett of Sigma Nu fills in the other forward slot. Gurnett was perhaps the top forward in the tourney and was instrumental in the Nu's advance to the finals.

Gurnett scored 15 points for the Nu's, one point from the top. In addition he played a whale of a defensive game. In the Delt contest he held the high-scoring Harry Breetzke to a lone field goal while in the finals, he held Mack Robinson to four.

Graef, Good
The fifth man on the first line-up is Dave Graef, top guard of Phi Delta Theta. Graef got only one chance to shine, but shine he did as he directed the futile Phi Delt attack against the Taus with considerable skill. His ball handling was excellent and his dribbling was terrific as he set-up Phi Delt scores time after time.

Barely nudged from the first line-up was Doyle Busskohl, manager-guard of the champion Taus. He leads the five men on the second tour-

ney team.

Busskohl was the second highest scorer in the tourney with 17 points.

The other four men on the second team are Lyle Altman and Chalmer Trout of Sigma Nu, Elmer Vandel of Delta Tau Delta, and Louie Roper of Phi Delta Theta.

Jim Schlegler and Paul Grimm top the Phi Gam and Class B tourney team. The third Fijii on the first line-up is Ron Raitt at guard.

Schlegler and Grimm were the spark of the champion Fijii outfit and proved it in the final contest with the Phi Deltas. The two placed one-two in the list of top scorers in their only game.

Schlegler played the most aggressive game in the tourney while Grimm got more than his share of rebounds and tip-ins.

Raitt was the top guard in the tournament, playing a strong defensive game.

Two Phi Deltas round out the first team as Pete Keene and Joe Morgan fill in at forward and guard.

Keene was the offensive spark of the Phi Delt attack and led all the tourney scorers in that department. Morgan, although playing forward most of the time, earns a tourney guard berth because of the scarcity of good guards.

Another forward filling in a berth at guard is Ed Raceley of the Phi Gam on the second line-up. Raceley did not play up to his usual game but still too good to be left out.

Rounding out the rest of the second team are Walt Weaver and Bill Henkle of Phi Delt, Ed Carter of the Sig Eps, and Don Larson of the Fijis.

ATO', Sig Gams on Top As Play Enters Final Week

Final 'A' and 'B' Ratings; All-University Playoff Soor

Two teams lead the University intramural basketball teams with one doomed to fall before the final ratings come out next week. Alpha Tau Omega and Sigma Gamma Epsilon, two of last week's three leaders held fast to their high perch over a week of furious activity.

The ATO's took a firm grip on

the top honors last week by winning the Fraternity "A" championship. The Sig Gams had previously captured the Independent title.

Delts Slip
The third team on top last week, Delta Tau Delta, tumbled to fourth place in this week's rankings. The Delts stumbled over a stubborn Sigma Nu outfit in the opening round of the "A" playoffs to drop the button out of their title hopes.

Sigma Nu, on the other hand, made the jump from fifth last week to this week's third place. The Nu's swung into the "A" finals before bowing to the ATO's.

Rounding out the first division in this next to the last week is Phi Delta Theta. The Phi Delt finished the season by bowing before the champion Taus in the first round of "A" play. Their seasonal record shows ten wins against two losses.

Fijis, Sig Eps Switch
Phi Epsilon traded positions since last week. The Fijis, beaten twice by Sigma Nu, took over the sixth rung largely on the strength of the showing their consourers made in the playoffs.

The Sig Eps occupy the seventh position with only two marks on their record, also. The fifth place Phi Delt own two wins over the Sig Eps this year.

Another tie mars the eighth and ninth positions this week. The two Denominational leaders, Lutherans and Newman Club, hold down these spots.

The two will meet Friday to break the tie and lay claim to the Denom championship.

The tenth best team in the University this week is the fraternity "B" champions, Phi Gamma Delta. The Junior Fijis are one of the three unbesten outfits left in the University and have eleven victories.

Catholics Gain
In the Denom bracket, Newman Club made the big gain by climbing into a tie for first with the Lutherans. The Catholics advanced to the finals of the Denom playoffs Wednesday night by trouncing Inter-Varsity, 53-43, setting the stage of playing off the tie Friday.

Inter-Varsity, although beaten, remained in third place in the ratings. Fourth and fifth positions remained unchanged as Presby House and Cotner House were idle with their season's ended.

"A" and "B" Ratings Final
Going into the ratings that

are final this week, we find the ATO's and Phi Gam "Bees" in the top spots they won over the week.

Behind the champion Taus and second place is Sigma Nu. Loser of only two games in 15 starts, The Nu's could have taken it all by winning that last fray with the Taus.

Finishing the season as the number three "A" team is Delta Tau Delta. The Delts, on top for the last four weeks, saw their title hopes go tumbling when they dropped their playoff opener to the Nu's. The third place team finished the season with a record of 12 wins and one loss.

Finishing in fourth and fifth were two teams with identical records. Both the Phi Delt and the Phi Gam ended the season with ten wins and two losses.

Behind sixth place Sigma Phi Epsilon are three teams with 9-3 records. Beta Theta Pi, Farm House, and Sigma Chi make up the core of the second division.

Rounding out the A ratings in tenth place is Brown Palace. The Palacers ended the year's playing with a record of 8-4.

Behind the champion Fijis in the final "B" ratings come Phi Delta Theta, Alpha Tau Omega, and Alpha Gamma Rho. Sigma Phi Epsilon finished in fifth place.

Both the Taus and the AGR's were ranked ahead of the Sig Eps, despite the fact that the Eps gained the playoffs. A poor Sig Ep showing in the opening round helped the ATO's and Aggies move ahead.

The final second division finds the Sig Alphas, Phi Psi's, Delta Upsilon, Sigma Nu, and the Kappa Sig's. All were far below the caliber of the first division.

Pentathlon Cards Sent to Schools

An unflinching portent of spring went out of the Athletic Department at the University of Nebraska this week.

Numerous and pentathlon cards were sent to each high school coach in the state.

The home-course pentathlon was started in 1921 so this is the thirtieth annual competition. Both events were started by the late Henry F. Schulte. The numerical awards were begun in 1923.

In the pentathlon, Beatrice High School was the team champion in 1921. Gene (Red) Littler's Beatrice team won it again in 1949.

Dean Brittenham, now a freshman at the University of Nebraska, was the individual champion in 1949. Brittenham scored 5,010 points. The individual high scorer over the years was Howard Debus, then a student at Lincoln High, who scored 5,931 1/2 points in 1940.

Farnam High School had the highest percentage of numerical winners among its boys in the first year of the numerical awards in 1923. Last year Bartley had the best record with 61 per cent of its male enrollment winning numerals.

Nancy Button is secretary and Barbara Best is the new treasurer of Associated Women Students organization, Sally Holmes announced yesterday.

In past years, the secretary has been a junior cabinet member with the highest number of votes and the treasurer, the sophomore cabinet member with the highest number of votes.
