Pyne Named Navy ROTC Staff Member

A Nebraskan has been selected to succeed a Nebraskan as executive officer of the Navy's ROTC unit at the University.

Capt. T. A. Donovan, commanding officer of the unit, announced Monday that Lt. Cmdr. George C. Pyne, formerly of St. Paul, will succeed Cmdr. R. P. Nicholson, formerly of Valentine, who is being re-assigned to the command of a submarine tender at San Diego, Cal. Both are former University students.

Commander Nicholson came to the Nebraska N.R.O.T.C. in July 1948. He served as a commander of a submarine during World War II in the Pacific.

Lieutenant Commander Pyne, is a graduate of Hastings College and a former University law student. He served as a Navy pilot during World War II and holds the Navy Cross, awarded for action against the Japanese fleet at Kure where he scored a direct hit on a battleship.

Spray Operators Ag Convo Slated

A conference for commercial spray operators will be held at the University College of Agriculture Monday, May 7, to bring them up to date on the latest research. A full day's program will include a series of short lectures and educational displays. Speakers will include Prof. O. S. Bare of the University, on small grain and alfalfa insect control. Dr. Hugo Graumann, USDA researcher, on alfalfa seed production and harvesting. Dr. R. E. Hill of the University on potato, sugar beet and corn insect control. Dr. Robert Staples of the University, on toxicity of insecticides. Dr. Martin H. Muma of the University, on heel fly control. Levi Mohler of the Nebraska state game commission, on conservation of wildlife. Neil Withrow, airport manager for the state aeronautics department, on spraying regulations. John Wehling of the University, on disease control in beans and potatoes. Also taking part in the meeting will be University weed researchers. They will speak on these topics: Range and pasture weed control. Defoliants. Crop injury from herbicides.
