# Frosh Prepare For Missouri Encounter

The Scarlet and Cream gridders will not be presenting a sneak preview when they play Texas Christian Saturday at 2:00 p. m. in Memorial Stadium.

For Bill Glassford's crew will be up against a team which already has one game under its belt.

The Horned Frogs dropped their seasonal opener to the Kansas Jayhawks last Saturday, 27-13. But that score, lopsided though it may seem, does not represent the true power of TCU, according to national football authorities.

Gil Bartosh, Coach Dutch Meyer's flashy quarterback, saw little action because of a leg injury. And the pre-season season football writeups pointed out that Texas Christian's offense would depend on Bartosh.

Furthermore, the news from down Texas way indicates he will be ready to go full force against Nebraska.

Brightest news in the Husker camp Thursday was that Cliff Hopp, linebacker, will be ready for duty against Texas Christian. He has been sidelined with an arm injury.

Glassford named three men who will definitely miss the Saturday fray because of injuries. They are Dick Westin, halfback; Dick Watson, center; and Harvey Goth, tackle.

All-American Bob Reynolds will suit up for the game, but Glassford said the only possible way he would see action was booting conversions. Glassford continued, however, that even this possibility is very remote since Bobby Decker is slated to kick the extra points.

Reynolds who received a separated shoulder at Curtis, has been running with the number one team at left half. But he was not suited up.

Glassford further said Reynolds probably will not play in either the Kansas State or Penn State games on Oct. 6 and 13. Following the Penn State contest, x-rays will again be taken of Reynolds'

shoulder to observe the healing process.

Aside from Westin, Watson, Goth and Reynolds, Glassford said the "general physical condition of the squad is good."

The Husker mentor made no comment on the final score, but he did say that "from the standpoint of overall organization, we are not as well prepared for Texas Christian this year as we were for Indiana last season."

Glassford attributed this to the lack of veteran material, minor injuries and the weather conditions at Curtis.

After spending the major part of its drills on TCU plays, the varsity concentrated on a general review and obtaining more polish Thursday.

Glassford expects to suit up about 50 players Saturday. He asserted that "Nebraska will need every man it has got against the Horned Frogs."

National football prognosticators have installed the Scarlet

and Cream as a six-point favorite.

The Texas Christian squad is expected to arrive in Lincoln this morning. It will workout on the Memorial Stadium turf at 2:00 p. m.

Offensively, Glassford will start Frank Simon and George Parnich, ends; Dick Regier and George Frochaska, tackles; Cliff Dale and Clayton Curtis, guards; and Verl Scott, center.

Running in the offensive backfield will be John Bordogna, quarterback; Tom Carodine and either Don Smith or Don Vogt, halfbacks; and Nick Aducci, fullback.

Carrying the Nebraska defensive load will be Dick Goll and Dennis Emanuel, ends; Gerry Minnick and Bob Mullen, tackles; and Ed Rummann and Carl Brase, guards.

In the defensive secondary will be Hopp and Bill Schabacker, linebackers; Carodine and Bordogna, halfbacks; and Decker, safety.

Only three men grace the Cornhusker roster who aren't frosh but several more may be added as the season progresses. George Gohde, Russ Morgan and Dick Watson are the only upperclassmen on the squad.

The Tigers will have considerably more experience under their belt when they play host to Hanscom's proteges. They already boast a 2 win—no loss record and have another contest this week. One of their decisions was over Kansas U. second team, 20-13.

A scrimmage Coach Hanscom has scheduled for this Friday will probably be a big factor in deciding his 36-man traveling squad.

An evergrowing injury list now includes Dick Watson, Jim Evans, Kenny Osborn, Mike Morton, George Mink, Jim Yiesley, and Dierk Ralston. Ralston who got his leg out of a cast shortly before the Varsity-Freshmen game, suffered a broken arm in the last

minute and half of play and could be out for the remainder of the season.

Hanscom's 72-man squad consists of two offensive units and one defensive with several players alternating between the two.
