the genuine liberal, but they still have to deal with the enlightenment that is present in our business and industry and commerce and national life.

"The book and the recent state-ments by Herbert Philbrick have been interesting and valuable. He's the Boston advertising man, you know, who served nine years as an FBI counterspy within the Communist party. He rose higher in Communist councils than any other FBI agent thus far revealed and he was a star government witness in the trial of the 11 top Communists in New York. "Philbrick has scorned the wide

application of the loyalty oath. He has said that the amateur and self-appointed loyalty sleuths and investigators are aiding the Com-munists. He is quoted as saying that Senator McCarthy is an aid and comfort to the Communist
