"These people, fortunately, are few in numbers although they're still dangerous. They must not only rout the American liberal and the genuine liberal, but they still have to deal with the enlightenment that is present in our business and industry and commerce and national life.

"The book and the recent statements by Herbert Philbrick have been interesting and valuable. He's the Boston advertising man, you know, who served nine years as an FBI counterspy within the Communist party. He rose higher in Communist councils than any other FBI agent thus far revealed and he was a star government witness in the trial of the 11 top Communists in New York.

"Philbrick has scorned the wide application of the loyalty oath. He has said that the amateur and self-appointed loyalty sleuths and investigators are aiding the Communists. He is quoted as saying that Senator McCarthy is an aid and comfort to the Communist party.

"Philbrick, it would appear, just might know what he's talking about since he had a 9-year dose of Communism and didn't have to demeritize himself at the end of it."

Far be it from me to add to this splendid bit of observation which I feel is almost perfect. I would like, however, to add one thing to Mr. Huntley's list of attributes of the liberal. I feel that it is necessary for a liberal to possess a sense of humor, to be able to laugh at even important things and, above all, to be able to laugh at himself.

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
