

Exam Schedule Arouses Controversy Over Position Given 9 a.m. Class Finals

Much controversy has arisen among some University students regarding the examination scheduling of the 9 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday classes on Saturday, May 31.

T. J. Thompson, dean of student affairs, explained that the Faculty Senate sets up the final examination schedules on a rotating basis. In other words, each exam moves up one day each examination period.

He added that rescheduling of final examinations is made only when there is an "inability regarding scheduling" or unless a great emergency arises.

FOREIGN STUDY Scholarships To Be Given By Airways

To encourage international education among the Americas, fifty air travel scholarships will be awarded by Braniff-International Airways for the 1952-53 school year. The airline began its Inter-American scholarship program in 1950.

Amounting to approximately \$30,000 the travel grants will be awarded to 25 Latin American students for graduate work in the United States and 25 U.S. scholars attending universities in the Latin American countries. Each award consists of a round-trip ticket, and authorization for a full year of academic study. They are available to any of the nine cities served by Braniff in Latin America and any of the 29 cities on its U.S. routes.

U.S. students may apply for scholarships to universities in the Braniff served countries of Cuba, Panama, Ecuador, Peru, Bolivia, Paraguay, Brazil and Argentina. To be eligible, a student must meet certain scholastic requirements set up by the Institute. He must be unable to personally provide for his transportation and a year of foreign study.

These scholarships are authorized by the Civil Aeronautics Board of the U.S. department of commerce. The Institute of International Education selects the students and administers the scholarships. The institute is a 27-year-old organization devoted to the exchange of students among 73 countries of the world.

North American students applying for these scholarships should write to the Institute of International Education, One East 67th Street, New York 21, N.Y.

Courses At Stockholm

The international graduate school at the University of Stockholm again offers its special one-year course for American students in the fields of political science, economics, and sociology. Elizabeth M. Oates of the University student division announced.

More than 200 American students have attended the international graduate school since its founding in 1945.

The course, which is approved by the Veterans Administration, will start in September. Tuition is \$100 and two \$600 scholarships are available.

Applications from both graduate and properly qualified undergraduate students should be submitted to the American-Scandinavian foundation, 127 East 73rd Street, New York, N.Y. Enrollment is limited to 45 men and women.
