

'Your University Speaks' Hits Six Years

Marking its six year anniversary this year, "Your University Speaks" will continue to broadcast its 15 minute program designed to help you know what goes on at the University.

The program was set up in 1946 to aid the selling of defense bonds, but when the war ended the Nebraska Broadcasting Association, the sponsor, not wanting to discontinue with the program turned it over to the University.

The program carried by about 15 Nebraska stations starts at 12:30 on Sunday afternoon and it is a year round program. It is carried by stations WOW, KFAB, KOLN, KOIL, WJAG, Norfolk, KOLT, Scottsbluff, KRNV, Lexington, KCOV, Alliance and KMMJ, Grand Island. The program originated over KFOR, Lincoln.

Keller and Round vary their program from interviews with the students, and the chancellor to music presented by the band, a symphony or the Madrigal Singers.

Keller stated that the type of interview that appeals to the public is usually by a botanist on insects or some similar subject. Also rating high in public appeal are the chancellor's programs.

All talks and interviews are of an educational nature. Keller also stated that though this is usually not the kind of program that appeals to students, last spring a national radio ratings test showed 70 per cent listening audience of the Lincoln area was students. Some member stations have estimated that approximately 400,000 people a week listen to this program.

This is the only program of its kind put on by a university. The University has several other of their own programs such as, Farm Facts and Fun, narrated by Round, which is in cooperation with Ag college, Across The Campus, also a feature of the Ag Campus, which is a daily show, and also The Farm Question Box.

Harding, a junior at the University, has chartered two Greyhound buses to take students to the game, Oct. 25. Sixty-six places will be available and Harding now has that number of tickets.

All reservations must be accompanied by a \$5 deposit, due Sept. 27. The remaining \$13.95 will be due by Oct. 11.

The buses will leave Lincoln Oct. 24 at 11:30 p.m. and arrive in Boulder Saturday morning, Oct. 25, at 9. They will leave Boulder at 12:15 Saturday night and arrive in Lincoln about 12:30 Sunday noon. The group will stop an hour for breakfast Sunday morning. Breakfast is not included in the fare and all other meals will be extra also.

Civil Service Departments Open 18 Jobs—Hixson

Applications for jobs in 18 civil service departments are now being accepted according to Dr. Ephraim Hixson, dean of resident instruction of Ag College.

He said that the applications would be accepted on Sept. 23 and continue until Oct. 21. Interested person may get the blank application in the Post Office. The form needed is 5000-AB.

All the jobs are with the Department of Interior and the Department of Agriculture. The departments have positions open for agricultural economists, agricultural writers and editors, agronomists, a n i m a l husbandmen (including animal physiologists and animal nutritionists), botanists, entomologists, fishery biologists, foresters, geneticists, home economists, horticulturists, plant pathologists, plant quarantine inspectors, poultry husbandmen, soil scientists, statisticians, wildlife biologists and zoologists.

The dean said the majority of the positions to be filled by the departments are in Washington, D. C. and through the United States. However, some of the agricultural options may be with other federal agencies in foreign countries.

The qualifications for the positions are passing of a written test and completion of a 4-year college course leading to a bachelor's degree or combine experience and education equal to a 4-year course.

The exception is if a student is planning on completing his course before June 30, 1953 he may also apply. The individuals in this case will receive a provisional appointment and on the completion of their course they will start their tour of duty.

Dean Hixson related that individuals who apply for the positions must be a United States citizen, physically able and between the ages of 18 and 35.

Starting salary for the different positions is \$3,410 a year. The worker will enjoy the same privileges as other civil service employees.

Any appointment to the civil service is probational for the first year. After the first year and satisfactory work is shown by the employee the salary increase will be \$125 a year until maximum salary for the position is reached.

AWs Makes Point System Revisions On Women's Participation, Office Holding In University Activities

Eleven point limit set

The maximum number of activities points that a girl may have under the revised point system is 11.

Sue Holmes, chairman of the activity point system released the revised rules Monday afternoon.

The system is designed to prevent girls from getting into too many activities, to prevent the top offices in organizations from being filled by a small number of girls and to make room in activities for more girls.

Miss Holmes emphasized the importance of checking the number of points a girl has before nominating her as the officer of an organization. Careful checking would avoid the possibility of having an officer forced to drop as soon as she was elected, she said.
