

Photography Lab Will Supply Nebraskan, Cornhusker Photos

The Committee on Student Publications voted to accept an offer from the University Photographic Laboratory to supply photographs to both the Nebraskan and the Daily Nebraskan.

The meeting, held Thursday, was called to select the photog-

raphers for the Daily Nebraskan and the Cornhusker, but decided to accept the Photo Lab's offer by a six to one margin, instead of continuing with the old system.

The Photo Lab agreed to take over the photo work of the two publications for the balance of

this year at a cost of \$1400. This price is about \$600 less than the two publications spent on photography last year.

Under the new plan, the Photo Lab will hire at least two students as part-time members of the photography staff.

The staff will be directly responsible for fulfilling the needs of The Daily Nebraskan and the Cornhusker needs for pictures.

As part of the contract price, the Photo Lab will become custodian of the photographic equipment owned by both publications and maintain the darkroom adjacent to The Daily Nebraskan offices.

The plan adopted by the committee boosts from 50 cents to \$1.50 the amount either publication may pay for free lance pictures, but both staffs will be limited to the number of such photos they may use. Free lancers will be expected to use their own supplies and equipment at the new price.

Selective Service Tests Applications Due Nov. 1

Students who are interested in taking the Selective Service College Qualification Test for deferment from the armed services must submit applications post-marked not later than midnight Saturday, Nov. 1, 1952.

All male students wishing possible deferment as college students—with the exception of those who have taken the test previously—are eligible to take the test. Applications for the December 4 test may be procured in Room

202 of the Veteran's Building, 12th and O Sts., or at any other selective service board.

Earning a high score on the test does not insure deferment. The local draft board has the final say as to whether to grant a deferment, regardless of the score earned on the test.

Students who have ROTC deferments or members of a reserve component need not take the test as they are already deferred.

Columbia Newspaper Forsakes Eisenhower

What would you do if even your own student newspaper were against you?

Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, Columbia University's president on leave, was presented with this situation when the Columbia student newspaper endorsed Gov. Adlai Stevenson for the presidency.

The Columbia Daily Spectator said that the hopes of millions of Americans who once believed in Eisenhower's great crusade have now been shattered.

Eisenhower in his presidential campaign has forsaken "principle for expediency" and shown himself a "plodding, orthodox, unimaginative thinker," the paper said in an editorial, and added:

"Consider the low level of Eisenhower's speeches. While Stevenson has expressed his opinions

on every major topic, Eisenhower has usually contented himself with a throw-the-rascals-out kind of campaign."
