NU Grad Of 1934 Wins Honor Farm Family Title

The Willard Waldo family living near DeWitt is Nebraska's 1952 Honor Farm Family.

As recipient of the seventh annual Honor Farm Family Recognition Award, which is sponsored by the Lincoln Sunday Journal and Star, Mr. and Mrs. Waldo and their three children will spend three days in Lincoln as guests of the Journal and Star. They will also receive \$500 as part of the award presentation.

Willard, better known as "Bill" throughout his community, is a former University student. He graduated from Ag College in 1934. He and his wife first lived in Omaha, where Waldo worked for Armour Packing Company. Following his job in Omaha, he spent two years at Stapleton as athletic coach and vocational agriculture instructor.

He served as county agent of Franklin County from 1936 to 1940. It was at this time that Waldo and his wife decided to move back to the farm, their decision being that the farm was the best place to raise the family they now had.

But it was to be six more years before their plan was realized. During the war Waldo served at Weeping Water as county agent of Cass County. Waldo said, explaining the delay, "The war was on and I just couldn't find a place to quit."

They moved onto their present farm near DeWitt in 1946. Since then Waldo has built it up until it is one of the outstanding farms in Gage County. He now operates a four hundred acre farm. He raises a great deal of livestock, all pure-

bred. Each member of the family takes an active part in community civic club, 4-H Club, FFA, county school, church, community civic club, 4-H Club, FFA, and Parent-Teachers Association.

If you ask persons in the DeWitt vicinity whether the Waldo family is a community leader, their answers sum up like this, "We just never think of them that way, but they are mighty good followers in all civic activity—and they always can get others to follow along with them."

Civil Service Applications Now Open

U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced the acceptance of applications for a Student Aid Trainee examination in the fields of physics, chemistry, mathematics, metallurgy and engineering for duty in Navy and Army establishments in Washington, D. C., and nearby Maryland and Virginia.

Salaries range from \$2,750 to \$3,175 a year. This examination is open only to persons who have completed one-fourth, one-half or three-fourths of a college engineering course or who expect to complete such study within nine months of the date of filing of application. A written test will be given.

Delta Upsilon Announces Scholarship Competition

The trustees of Delta Upsilon Educational Foundation invites applications for six leadership scholarships to be awarded on or about Dec. 15.

The scholarships were created to give financial aid to male undergraduates in colleges and universities in the United States and Canada. They must have leadership potentiality and have demonstrated some actual constructive achievement on the campus. Each award is valued at \$500.

The Foundation was established in December, 1949, as a non-profit corporation under the laws of Ohio, with offices in Columbus.

The objects and purposes of the corporation are purely educational and charitable. Although its organizers were alumni of Delta Upsilon, recipients of the scholarships do not have to be members of Delta Upsilon. The Foundation has no connection whatsoever with Delta Upsilon Fraternity.

Instructions to applicants are as follows:

1. Applications will be received until Dec. 1 and should be mailed to Delta Upsilon Educational Foundation, P.O. Box

1633, Columbus 16, Ohio. There are no application forms.

2. The letter of application should be typewritten and include biographical data, a transcript of academic record in college, full information as to college activities and honors, financial need of the applicant, including scholarships and grants-in-aid now being received, a brief statement of the reasons applicant believes he is worthy of a scholarship, based on leadership potentiality and demonstrated leadership on the campus.

3. The letter of application must be accompanied by a picture of the applicant, two letters of recommendation from faculty members, and two letters of recommendation from student leaders.

4. Applicant should request the dean to write a letter of recommendation or comment. This letter should be separately mailed to the Foundation.

5. The applicant may be asked to interview a representative of the Foundation's Trustees at a time and place suitable to both.

6. Successful applicants will be notified in writing between Dec. 15 and Dec. 31.
