Southern Cal stormed off to the Rose Bowl on the strength of its 14-2 decision over previously undefeated UCLA. The victory gave USC the Pacific Coast Conference championship with a record of nine wins and no losses.

Jim Sears, a 164 pound senior fullback strengthened his claim to all-American honors as he dashed 70 yards for a touchdown on a lateral, and passed for the second, a decisive marker to Al Carmichael.

Both teams were so evenly matched that the final score seemed to have rested on Sears inspired play.

Fine defensive ball was the watchword as UCLA notched 10 first downs, and the winners only 6.

**Tigers Upset KU**

Missouri gained undisputed 2nd place in the final Big 7 standings as the underdog Tigers whipped the Kansas 20-19.

A deflected pass was Missouri's margin of victory as Tiger end Jack Hurley deflected, then intercepted a pass late in the fourth quarter to set up the winning touchdown.

Paul Fuchs two successful tries for extra point in the first half gave Missouri a 14-6 half time lead. Gil Reich had a long afternoon as he missed two tries for extra point, then an attempt for a field goal late in the fourth quarter. Earlier in the game he was taken from his left half position with a broken finger on his right hand.

# Sig Eps Top Mustang Gridders For Crown

A smooth-operating band of Sig Eps, disregarding a freezing rain and the undefeated record of the Mustangs, rolled to their second consecutive All-University 1-M football championship Monday night. Sigma Phi Epsilon successfully defended their All-U honors by dropping the independent champion Mustangs by a 24-7 score.

A vicious line that sprung Ted Kratt to 60 yards rushing and the passing combination of Kratt to Bill Anderson paved the way to victory for the champs. Kratt carried the mail 15 times during the fray, 11 of the carries going for yardage as the Sig Ep linemen shredded the heralded Mustang defense.

The independent winners were at a disadvantage throughout the contest as they played without the services of their burly lineman, Don Summers.

**Accurate Passing**

The Sig Eps completed 13 of 24 aeriels in the tight Mustang secondary with Anderson stealing the show by grabbing nine of these, including three for touchdowns.

The champs notched six points each quarter in rolling to the title, completely commanding the contest throughout the first half.

The Mustangs were allowed only seven attempts to advance the ball in that first half of the game, the Sig Eps handling the pigskin 24 times.

The champions started the contest on their own 15 and drove to a score in seven plays. Kratt had runs of five and six yards and pass completions to Hyle Thibault, Fred Petersen and Anderson for yardage of 15, two and 22 yards in the drive, the latter producing the initial tally.

The Mustangs gained only one yard in their first offensive show and bottled to the Sig Ep 14 where once again the champs were off.

Kratt ran right end for five, passed to Bob Svanda for nine and rounded right end again for nine to produce a first down on their 38.

**Mustangs Hold**

Starting the second quarter, they moved to the Mustang 23 on two straight Kratt to Anderson aeriels for another first down. Anderson gathered in another loss to the Mustang ten, but here the losers began to stiffen. Kratt was tossed for two consecutive losses and two passes pushed only to the two where the Mustangs took over.

Jack Mankmyer punted out for the independent winners, the Sig Eps taking over on their 31 and striking out once again.

Kratt hit Anderson for 31 yards and after two aeriels had dropped untouched, he connected with Andy for the second touchdown, a 13-yard production. With only a minute remaining in the half, three passes resulted in three interceptions. Svanda pilfered two Mankmyer tosses while Marv Green intercepted a Kratt heave to round out the first half.

The losers were still unable to move opening the third stanza. Failing to move out the Sig Ep linemen, they were forced to punt to the Mustang 26 from where the champs needed only four plays to score again. This time Anderson took

Upsets ruled the day as Nelson and Bill Mundell were high with five and one half games out of ten. Mundell was the only predictor to pick Alabama over Maryland.

Ed Berg, who could only manage two and one half right, slipped to low man on the totem pole.

In the big game this week Army-Navy, only two men, Serr and Kushner picked the Cadets.
