

Iron Curtain Refugees Overtax European Aid

European religious relief agencies are feeling an ever heavier load of work put on them as refugees from behind the Iron Curtain turn to them for aid out of distrust for any government.

This statement was made by Madeline Barot, director of the French Protestant relief agency, Cimade, who came to Lincoln to renew acquaintance with Antonin Horak, now an apartment manager...

Horak and his family escaped from the Communists in 1948 and arrived in France with no money at all. There they turned to their church, and they were cared for by Cimade for more than three years.

Before leaving France last March for the U. S., Horak helped the agency set up one of several Cimade centers in France and Germany to care for refugee families and students.

It is people like the Horaks, who distrust government and turn to the religious agencies, who create the need for more money for Cimade and like groups, Miss Barot said.

Miss Barot continued that new trust in churches is a great opportunity but an enormous task. The refugee problem is worldwide, and the world-wide church organizations have shown their worthiness, she said.

While in Lincoln, the Frenchwoman spoke to several church groups, expressing special interest in visiting this part of the nation because it has contributed much to CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program)...
