C. Clayton To Speak At Convocation

Charles C. Clayton, editorial writer for the St. Louis Globe-Democrat and native Nebraskan, will be the featured speaker at a School of Journalism convocation in Low Library auditorium, Wednesday at 4 p.m.

His subject will be "Press Freedom: Promise and Performance." The convocation will be the first in the series for the second semester.

Clayton was born in Cambridge, Neb., in 1902 and attended the University for three years before moving to Missouri, where he was graduated from the University of Missouri in 1925. He has been successively a reporter, city editor and editorial writer for the Globe-Democrat since that date and has been a lecturer in Journalism at several colleges since 1934.

He is the author of a book "Newspaper Reporting Today," and numerous magazine articles. He is a past national president of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism group.
