

Students Pose In Live Representations Of Paintings; Lectures, Panel Discussions Scheduled At NU Galleries



A live representation of 10 famous paintings by actors marked the opening Sunday of the 63rd annual exhibition of the Nebraska Art Association at the Union.

Mary Loomis, senior in Teachers college, presented one of the living pictures, "Mlle. Charlotte Du Val D'ognes," which was a portrait of a French girl.

Contemporary art, ranging from realism to abstraction, is represented by 239 works brought to the Morrill Hall galleries by the selections of Duard Laging, art department chairman, and Norman Geske, assistant director of the University galleries.

The works characterize the contemporary scene in art with sculpture, painting, in various media, and pottery. Morris Davidson's oil, "Boats In Harbor," represents a good example of the contemporary show. The picture is abstract, yet the forms on it are recognizable.

Hamilton To Serve As Visiting Lecturer

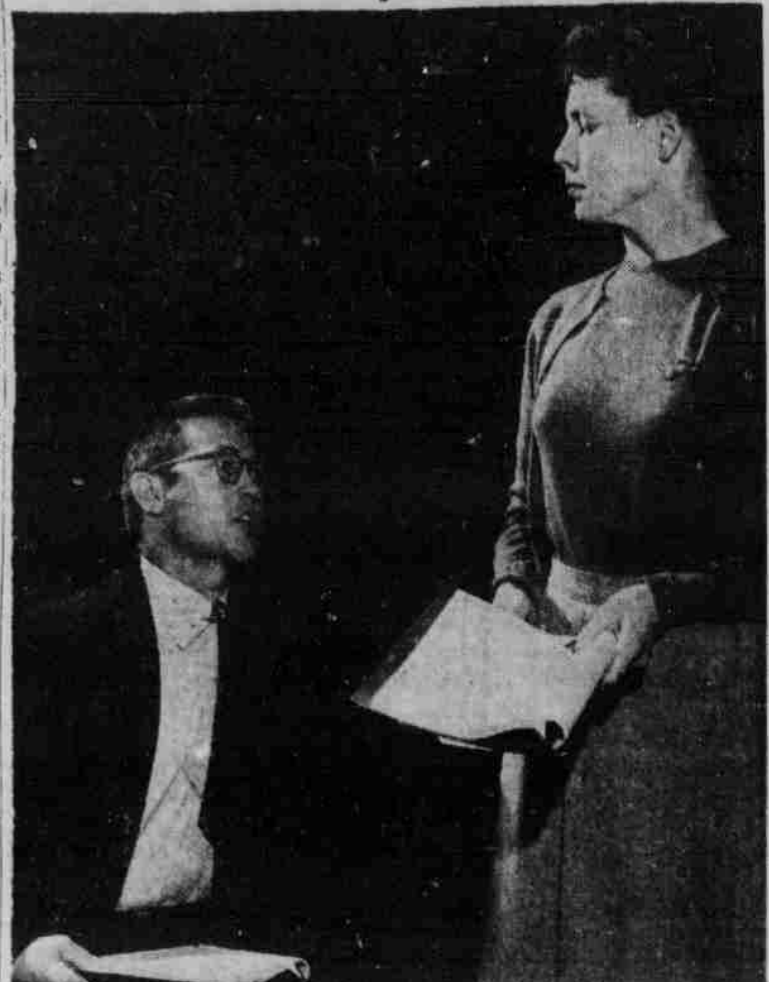
Dr. Walton Hale Hamilton, economist-lawyer and author, will be at the University Wednesday through Friday as a visiting lecturer.

Maj. Gen. Harry A. Johnson, commanding General of the 10th Air Force, announced a special board will hold interviews for members of the Air Force Reserve, Mar. 4-17 in temporary Building "J" on 15th and Vine Sts.

The interviews are being held to provide the Air Force with accurate, up-to-date information on members of the reserve. Not to gain information for using involuntary recall procedures.

Reservists are being notified of the interviews by mail, and given an appointment with the interviewing team, in order that the Air Force may obtain information regarding their present civilian occupation, number of dependents, physical condition, and to determine the reservists most appropriate Air-Force speciality.

Gen. Johnson noted, "the reservist can rest assured that responding to this inventory in no way, increases his vulnerability for recall to active service."

State Department Offers Positions In Foreign Service

The United States State Department has announced a September examination for the appointment of foreign service officers at the closest Civil Service examination center.

Appointments are made in the \$4,000 to \$5,000 per annum salary range after successful completion of written, oral and physical examinations. Candidate must be at least 20 and under 31 years of age as of July 1, 1953, a citizen of the United States for at least ten years, and if married, married to an American citizen.

Broadly speaking, the responsibilities of a Foreign Service officer are to carry out the foreign policy of the President as expressed in the directives of the Secretary of State, to keep the United States Government informed of developments abroad, to protect American citizens and interests in foreign countries, and to cultivate and maintain friendly relations with peoples of other nations.

Specifically, the duties of a Foreign Service officer include: negotiation with foreign officials; political reporting; economic, commercial, and agricultural reporting;

issuance of visas and passports; and the development of cultural and informational programs.

Applications should be forwarded to the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service, United States Department of State, Washington 25, D. C., before July 1, 1953.

Divinity Scholarships

Bexley Hall, the Divinity School of Kenyon College, announces the establishment of three Firestone Scholarships with a value of \$3,000 each, to be granted for the three-year theological course leading to the B. O. degree.

The awards will be made to postulant for Holy Orders in any diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States upon the basis of character, scholarship and qualities of leadership as exemplified by the candidates' record in college.

Candidates should submit transcripts before May 1, covering at least the first three and one-half years of their college course and furnish evidence that they will receive their degree by September, '53.
