The big question around the mid-west today is whether the pact between the Big Ten and West Coast concerning the Rose Bowl will be eliminated.

Although the actual vote will not be taken until May at the annual Big Ten meeting, the controversy has come out into the open for the public to see. It seems that as matters stand now Purdue and Northwestern hold the key to the final decision.

Michigan State, Minnesota and Wisconsin have given indications that they will attempt to set up a bloc against the extension of the Rose Bowl relationship.

Public opinion tends to give the nod to the continuance of the pact. Minnesota and Wisconsin have already voted negatively against the extension and Illinois has stated that they would accept a renewal with certain limitations.

If Purdue and Northwestern deagainst the renewal, there will be a deadlock and the can cellation of the pact will result. There is reason to believe though that Purdue will vote for the continuance of the pact, but North-western's view is still in doubt.

A 6-4 affirmative vote is needed for the renewal of the pact of the January 1st classic.
