

College Clinic Founder Of Daily Nebraskan Predecessor, George Putnam, Recalls PE Chairman To Participate In Convention

Mental Needs

The first offices of The Daily Nebraskan were only in the heads of its writers.

George Putnam, founder of The Nebraskan which later became The Daily Nebraskan, said the monthly paper had no regular place where news was written and edited, and was printed on a job basis by a local printing office.

Two other students were staff members, with Putnam serving as editor-in-chief. He also noted that The Nebraskan had an extensive group of reporters.

Putnam said that The Nebraskan was instrumental in changing the school colors from old gold to the present Scarlet and Cream.

"We printed notices of a student meeting to be held to decide the question of whether or not to change the colors and if they were changed, what the colors were to be," he added.

The paper was the spokesman for the fraternity groups at the University at that time, Putnam noted that many groups had their own publications, which were all used to sway student opinion.

When the meeting to decide on the colors change was actually held, there was a large block of

students in favor of the shift to Scarlet and Cream. The vote eventually passed the student body, and the change was made.

When asked why the change was suggested, Putnam said that old gold did not make a very brilliant show when used at school functions, and several other schools had already adopted it for their colors.

Putnam, the 21st member of the University chapter of Beta Theta Pi, was forced, because of financial reasons, to leave school during the second semester of his sophomore year. He said simply, "my money just gave out." On leaving Nebraska he went to San Diego, California.

There, he worked as an engineer on road building crews in the mountains. "The only trouble in being an engineer, in those days," he said, "was that it was strictly seasonal or part-time work. When the snow fell in the mountains I was out of a job."

When work ended for the winter season, Putnam began working with newspapers, and became the first city editor of the San Diego Tribune.

After working as city editor,

Putnam became personal secretary to E. W. Scripps, serving in that capacity for five years. He then became manager of the Scripps-McRae news service, later to become the United Press.

In 1902, Putnam went to Spokane as editor of a Scripps paper. "Mr. Scripps told me to run a four page newspaper but I worked so hard selling advertising and subscriptions that the paper had eight pages. When Mr. Scripps heard about this, he became very

angry, and we ended our business arrangement," Putnam explained. Putnam then became news editor of the Portland Journal, remaining there for three years.

In 1907, Putnam went to Medford, Oregon and consolidated three newspapers he had purchased. In 1910, he added another paper to the three and formed the Medford Mail Tribune.

Mr. Putnam remained as editor of the Medford Mail Tribune for 30 years, selling the paper this year. He still is active in newspaper work, retaining the title of editor emeritus of the Tribune.

In 1951, Putnam received the Amos E. Voorhies Award of the Oregon Newspaper Publisher's Association for outstanding contributions to Oregon newspapers.

This award is not given annually; only when particularly outstanding achievements merit it.

Putnam, listed in "Who's Who," has been cited for his outstanding work and writing on behalf of freedom of the press in a book by George Turnbul.

He is paying a "last visit" to the University chapter and attended the 64 annual initiation ceremony held Sunday at the Lincoln Hotel.

Father Poage said Monday afternoon that similar ideals and intellectual competence are two fundamental prerequisites for a successful marriage.

Father Poage maintained a man or woman must be able to evaluate members of the opposite sex in order to judge them and choose the correct wife or husband.

One also must be able to distinguish between characteristics such as the "emotional and the passionate" and "the stubborn and the determined," he explained, saying this was necessary also for a successful marriage.

He stressed the importance of economic soundness, adding that lack of any security whatsoever may lead to a dissatisfied marriage.

"If couples base marriage entirely on the physical level, there is nothing to hold the marriage together," he declared.

Farnsworth was born in Troy, West Virginia and received his M.D. degree from Harvard Medical School in 1933. Between the war years (1941-45) he served with the U. S. Naval Medical Corps, working in the Naval Hospitals at Philadelphia, Oakland, Palm Beach, and on a hospital ship.

Farnsworth is president elect of the American College Health Association for term of 1952-53 and lecturer on medicine at Harvard University.

NU Faculty Members To Lecture In Omaha

The University of Nebraska chapter of Sigma Xi, national scientific research society, will meet Tuesday evening on the College of Medicine campus in Omaha.

The program will consist of three papers read by University staff members: "Studies of Terrestrial Parasites of Marine Fishes" by Dr. H. W. Manter, professor of zoology; "An Experimental Investigation of the Psycho-Genetic Factors Involved in Ulcer Etiology" by John Weisz, doctoral candidate in experimental psychology and "Current Research on Listeriosis" by Dr. Carl Olson, professor of animal pathology and hygiene.

There is a strong pressure on doctors to be a quack because of patient influence, he stated.

Dr. Bauer emphasized the importance of being able to recognize quackery. He listed three main points for detecting false aids:

1. Be suspicious of any form of medical treatment that is claimed to be a secret. Legitimate doctors are interested in the welfare of the public and distribute information on a successful cure.
2. Take care when there is a question of paying in advance. Most reputable physicians don't ask for payment in advance except in specific cases.
3. Be suspicious when the doctor excessively seeks publicity. Good doctors do not seek excessive publicity except when it is part of the job and they are speaking specifically for organized medicine.

Education Helps Detect 'Quackery'

Education is the ultimate answer to enable the average person to distinguish between sound advice and quackery.

William V. Bauer, director of health education, radio and television for the American Medical Association, said this during a talk on "Fads and Quackery" Tuesday.

He noted that laws help prevent the sale of detrimental products, but education is necessary in order to put these laws into real use.

Quacks, Dr. Bauer explained, often use a person's emotions to persuade them to buy their products.
