

Educational TV Use Conference Scheduled

A conference on how Nebraska can best utilize the medium of television for educational purposes will be held Friday in Love Library auditorium.

The meeting, an all-day affair, is being arranged by the University's Television Committee and is open to all students and faculty members.

The morning session will open at 10 a.m. with a statement of conference objectives by Chancellor R. G. Gustavson. Paul Reed, assistant director of the Joint Committee on Educational Television, Washington, D. C., will report on Federal Communication Commission policies affecting educational television, and on the program of the Joint Committee.

Dr. K. O. Broady, director of the University Extension Division and business administration professor and conference chairman, will preside at a noon luncheon in the Union ballroom. George Round, University Public Relations Director, will report on the present status of educational television in Nebraska.

Various areas of education in which television might be used will be under discussion at the afternoon session. State Sen. Richard Marvel, of Hastings, chairman of the Legislature Education Committee, will preside at this meeting.
