Nebraska basketball fans will be seeing one of the nation's finest guards in action Saturday night when the Huskers take on Minnesota. He is Charley Mencil, a 5-11 dazler who led the Gophers in scoring last season with 378 points.

Oklahoma Leads In Cross-Country

Oklahoma is the all-time leader in Big Six-Big Seven Conference cross country running, a compilation of final placings since the circuit was formed in 1928 shows.

The all-time rankings: Oklahoma 2.67, Kansas State 2.98, Kansas (champion the last seven seasons in a row) 3.18, Colorado 3.5, Iowa State 3.78, Missouri 4.03 and Nebraska 4.59.

During 20 years of operation of the old Big Six loop, Kansas State was the leader with an average rank of 2.27, followed by Oklahoma 2.8, Iowa State 3.38, Nebraska 4.0, Missouri 4.04 and Kansas 4.11.

In six years of operation as the Big Seven, Kansas holds the lead with a 1.0 mark, followed by Oklahoma 2.3, Colorado 3.5, Missouri 4.0, Iowa State 4.75, Kansas State 5.1 and Nebraska 6.3.

A beefy Minnesota basketball crew invades Cornhuskerland Saturday night for the season-opening game for both schools. Tip-off time is 8 p.m.

Nebraska's probable starting lineup will shade the Gophers' No. 1 unit in height, but when it comes to weight — so valuable in rebounding — Minnesota will have the advantage.

Big Ed Kalafat, 6-foot-6-inch Gopher captain and center, weighs 245 pounds. He will play opposite Husker Bill Johnson, Lincoln, who stands 6-7 and weighs 205. Kalafat was an All-Big Ten second team choice a year ago.

Minnesota Forward Virgil Miller (6-3) is listed at 225 while the other front-liner, Dick Garmaker (6-3) weighs an even 200.

"Tiniest" man on the opening five from the Northland is All-Big Ten Guard Charlie Mencil who stands 5-11½ and weighs 176. The other probably starter at guard is Charles Bennett, 6-3 and 189.

The Cornhusker quintet will average 6-4 in height with Willard Fagler (6-5), Harvard, and Don Weber (6-3), Esterville, Ia., at forwards, and Fred Seger (6-4), Omaha, and Chuck Smith (6-4½), Anderson, Ind., at guards.

Fagler and Seger weigh 180, Weber 175, and Smith 185.

All of the Husker starters but Smith are veterans of two campaigns as are all the Minnesota probables except Garmaker. Smith is a sophomore; Garmaker is a junior.

Tallest man on the Minnesota squad is Sophomore William Simonovich who is 6 feet-11 inches tall and weighs 275 pounds.

Last season Nebraska lost to the Gophers 71-62 at Minneapolis.

Minnesota handed Indiana, the N.C.A.A. champion, one of its three defeats last year. The Gophers downed the Hoosiers 65-63 at Minneapolis, but lost 66-63 at Bloomington, Ind. Minnesota is considered the team with the best chance to displace Indiana as Big Ten champions this year. Halftime program for Saturday night will feature recognition of student pep leaders by the Nebraska Student Council.

Two Freshman Outfits To Present Pre-Game Curtain Raiser Saturday

Nebraska's freshman basketballers, tutored by Coach W. D. (Tony) Sharpe, will have an intra-squad game as a preliminary to Saturday night's Minnesota-Nebraska court fray. Game time for the frosh event is 6:15 p.m.
