# Original Illustrations On Exhibition At Union

Paintings Serve To Tell Stories

Displayed in the Union Lounge this week is an exhibit of original paintings and water colors which have appeared on the cover and as illustrations in the Saturday Evening Post.

According to Kenneth Stuart, Post art editor, the exhibition was assembled in response to requests from universities, art schools, art groups and art institutes. Stuart said the requests possibly stemmed from an exhibit at Radio City in New York of magazine illustrations to which the Society of Illustrators invited the public in 1945.

A COMMITTEE of artists selected 117 pictures for the show as being the best in the field and 57 had appeared originally in the Post.

The great virtue of an exhibit of this type is that the pictures are not reprints but are originals. Students may have the opportunity to view a Norman Rockwell painting up close, to study his style and stroke and see the actual product of his brush.

The marked import of the exhibit is that the pictures on display are not examples of abstract or modern art but strive to depict the theme as actually and lifelike as the artist is capable of doing.

STUART WRITES in the introductory pamphlet which accompanies the exhibit, that the best way to approach the exhibit is to recognize the pictures to be outstanding examples of illustration.

Stuart writes that the exhibition is not and does not purport to be, an exhibition of great paintings.

"A great painting," he writes, "is one in which a skilled painter has succeeded in combining line, form, color and so on, into an harmonious and balanced whole. A great illustration is quite different."

STUART DISTINGUISHES between an illustration and a painting by writing, "The illustrative art is a handmaiden; it is painting and good painting, but is employed to serve the ends of emphasis upon a story idea."

"The story idea may be that of a fiction writer whose work the illustrator is called upon to depict. Sometimes the story idea is one which the artist himself has originated, as in a cover painting."

"In any event," Stuart writes, "any good illustration subordinates the artist's plastic skill to
