Dennis Sanders, photographer for the University Photographie Production Laboratory, is the photographer of the film "Time Out Of War," one of the Film Society series.

The plot is an adaptation of "Pickets" (an old war term for reconnaissance scouts) by Robert Chambers. The setting is Virginia during the Civil War.

THE STORY concerns fraternization between enemies during the War. It tells the story of two scouts from the North and one from the South, who meet at a river where one of them is fishing. A temporary truce is called as the movie continues.
