NCAA Places Kansas State **On Probation For One Year**

The National Collegiate Athletic Association Council imposed penalties on seven member colence Saturday. The schools were charged primarily with trying out prospective athletes, Among the schools that were placed on probation was Kansas State of the Big Seven. The Wildcats, however, had no restrictions placed on any of their future contests in regard to possible national collegiate championships.

Kansas State was guilty of trying out prospective football prospects in 1951 and trying out three prospective basketball players in 1952.
