The fading University of Nebraska baseball team dropped their third straight Big Seven game Monday as the high-flying Missouri Tigers stopped them 3-1. The game was held on the Columbia diamond.

Walks hurt the Husker cause most of the way. Starter Brian Sievers, a sophomore lefty, and his successor, righthander Pat Mallette gave up 11 walks between them while Ed Cook of Missouri allowed only one free pass. Only one Husker reached third base after the third frame.

The loss gave the Huskers a 4-7 record in Big Seven play. The win enabled the Tigers to hold their first-place lead over the Oklahoma Sooners.
