Lucke Heads 291 Freshmen Receiving Regents Awards

Lucke led 2,594 students from 426 Nebraska high schools in the tests. The examination covered the main fields of study which are offered at public schools. All students took the same examination.

THE SCHOLARSHIP amounts to \$100 and can be renewed by students if their grades remain above a certain average. The scholarship winners were recently announced by Dr. George Rosenlof, dean of admissions.

"All our students from abroad should mingle within the active campus life and become real Cornhuskers in every sense of the word," Rosenlof continued at the club's first meeting.

ROSENLOF SPOKE of many points of interest each foreign student should try to see while he is at the University. All foreign students, he said, are welcome in the dean's office for advice or assistance of any type.

Hans Steffen, a student from Germany and president of the club, welcomed the new students and gave an outline of the club's proposed activities for the school year.

All foreign students on campus and all American students wishing to meet students from abroad are invited to Cosmopolitan Club meetings, held the first and third Wednesday of each month, Steffen said.
