 Bob Oberlin, senior center from West Allis, Wis., forced to sit out last week's game, will be back at center. The only doubtful spot appeared to be at center on the second unit. LaVerne Terezon, whose inspired play helped the Huskers plow Iowa State under 39-14, may get the call over Bob Berguin at the pivot spot. Both Terezon and Berguin are sophomores.
 As the two teams presently line up, there are nine seniors, two

juniors on the first eleven. Three seniors, Bill Giles, Dennis Korinek and Pev Evans help stabilize the second unit which comprises one junior (John Edwards) and seven sophomores.
 John Edwards, junior fullback from North Platte, won the award of the "hustlingest" player in the Husker victory over Iowa State. Edwards got Dennis (The Menace) Korinek around the corner with a key block, recovered, and managed to get across the field when Korinek reversed, and cut down two other potential tacklers. It enabled Korinek to run 70 yards to score.

One of the most improved players this fall for the Cornhuskers has been Charles Bryant, senior guard from Omaha. Bryant, who wrestled with the Cornhusker mat team at 167 last winter, has grown to a powerful 197 pounds.

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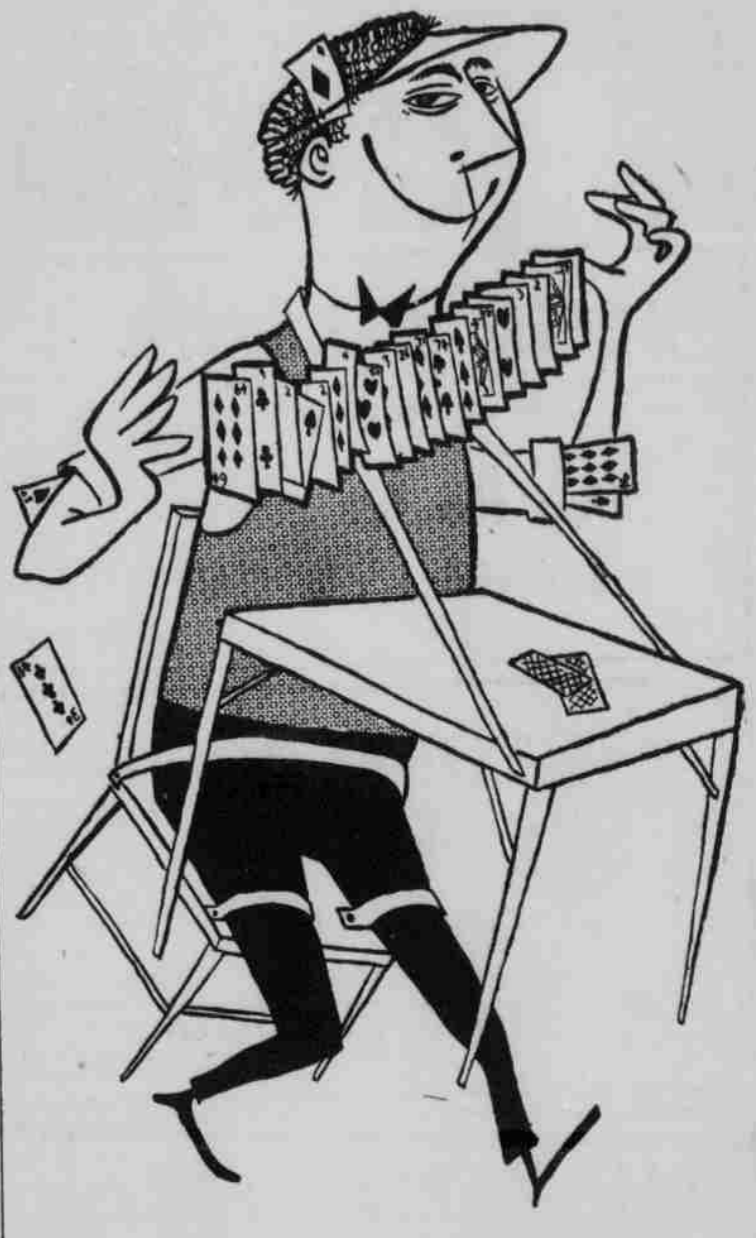
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
