Program Released For Alum Round-Up

Plans for the Annual Round-Up of University alumni were announced Tuesday by James S. Pittenger, alumni secretary.

Highlights on the schedule include the Innocents Alumni Banquet at 6:30 p.m. June 11, and the 54th Anniversary Dinner of Black Masque chapter of Mortar Board, at 6 p.m. June 10.

Miss Elsie Ford Piper, former assistant dean of women and an honorary Mortar Board of 1928, is in charge of arrangements for the MB dinner. She said she expected an attendance of 250 at the dinner.

Black Masque, a senior women's honorary, was organized on the University campus in 1905. The group became a chapter of Mortar Board, national senior women's honorary, in 1920.

Persons representing each class of Mortar Boards have contacted other members of their classes issuing invitations to the dinner.

Miss Piper has edited a directory of the names and addresses of all members of Mortar Board since its origination on the University campus. The directory will be given to all who attend the dinner, Miss Piper said.

The Innocents Banquet will be a social affair with no particular program, Pittenger said. Invitations have been sent to all Innocents alumni, he said.

Exam Schedule
