more than 18 hours (17 hours in Arts and Sciences.)
Students registering for evening classes in the Extension Division in addition to regular classes, should have their advisor make out a drop and add worksheet, which the students will take to the Extension Division, 101 Architectural Hall for processing, Mrs. Laase said.

Fees will be payable for undergraduate students with last names beginning with letters A to G, Monday, Jan. 30; H to N, Tuesday, Jan. 31, and O to Z, Wednesday, Feb. 1.

Students who cannot pay their fees on the assigned day may either claim their registration and pay their fees with a late fee of \$3.00 on Monday, Feb. 6 or arrange with a friend, to whom they have given a check for the amount of the fees and a set of filled-out personal data cards to claim their registration for them and pay fees on the correct day. All payment of fees will be at the drill floor of the Military and Naval Science Building.

Each student should bring a pencil when he comes to register. The Assignment Committee will not have any this time. Each student should bring his copy of the schedule, as only one copy per student was allowed when the schedules were printed.

Students not completing registration on Jan. 16-19, can do so with the new students and graduate students on February 3.

Students in the Graduate College, and those working for an advanced professional degree in teachers College, will register from Feb. 4 to 18. Late fees for these students begins on Feb. 13.
