

In 1905, the Order of the Black old University Hall and sang the Masque, the local chapter of Mortar Board, was founded. The masking of outstanding junior women added more excitement to Ivy Day.

Ivy and Daisy chains were added in 1910. Fifty girls carried the chains around the campus. The first May Queen was crowned in 1912.
